

## **Abstract**

Traditional economic methodologies have left significant gaps in how we understand critical issues like human welfare, climate change, and the historical evolution of monetary systems. In this talk, we explore two major methodological mistakes that have constrained research: the neglect of historical context and the exclusion of human welfare. These blind spots offer exciting opportunities for students to conduct innovative and impactful research.

Through practical examples—ranging from the role of war in shaping monetary policy to the welfare costs of unemployment and climate change—we'll demonstrate how addressing these gaps can lead to groundbreaking contributions. We'll also introduce Agent-Based Modeling (ABM), a powerful tool that allows economists to model complex systems more realistically than traditional models. By embracing modern tools and pragmatic approaches, students can challenge mainstream assumptions while still succeeding in academic circles.
